Megasite Project Update



Development of the Greensboro-Randolph Megasite project remains a top priority for Randolph County and our regional partners, and significant strides continue to be made. With a growing list of preliminary items completed, the megasite project team is now focused on infrastructure development and marketing. Great progress has been made with respect to infrastructure. The City of Greensboro is nearly complete with the design and engineering of the water and sewer infrastructure which will be needed to serve the site, and an application is pending

Thrive in the Heart of North Carolina. with the Golden LEAF Foundation in an effort to secure funds to assist with the cost of the infrastructure. Additional details are available in an October 18 <u>article</u> published by the Greensboro News & Record. In addition to water and sewer infrastructure, Duke Energy is in the midst of a siting study to determine how to best serve the megasite's projected power needs. Two public meetings have already been held to provide information and gather feedback from area residents. Formal route recommendations are expected to be available sometime in the first quarter of 2017. The final piece of infrastructure planning which is currently in process is for transportation. Using NCDOT standards, the Greensboro-Randolph Megasite Foundation is funding preliminary evaluation and design of interchanges on US Hwy 421 to ensure safe and appropriate highway access to the site.

With most major development hurdles cleared and site certification secured, the megasite team is intensely focused on marketing the site. In addition to a marketing trip in August, EDC president Bonnie Renfro and a team representing the site are working to schedule future meetings with consultants who assist clients in siting large OEM projects. A professional marketing firm has also been retained to assist with product messaging, development of high quality marketing collateral, and implementation of final improvements to the website which is found at <u>www.greensboro-randolphmegasite.com</u>.

Seagrove-based **Chief Express** brought home awards again from the annual NC Trucking Association conference which was held in Asheville. The company was awarded second place Safest Local Fleet in the 0-1,000,000 miles category and honored for Zero Accidents Local Fleet 0-1,000,000 miles. In addition, Chief's David Hilton received the 2016 NCTA Driver of the Year award. Trinity-based **Gary J. Younts Machine Co.** is contemplating an expansion and relocation to another parcel in Trinity near the current facility. The 29 year old business has outgrown its building and is making plans to construct four new 15,000 square foot buildings on 8.68 acres owned by Mr. Younts. The company has requested assistance from the City of Trinity to connect to public sewer which does not yet serve the property. If the sewer need can be effectively addressed, the company will invest an estimated \$4 million to construct the buildings and will create at least 15 new jobs over a two year period, more than doubling the current workforce of 14. Grant applications will be reviewed by the City of Trinity and Randolph County at upcoming meetings. Younts Machine is a job shop which manufactures machined parts for a wide variety of customers. **Method Sourcing Corporation** is relocating from NY to Archdale to the former Meredith Transport facility at Interstate Business Park. The company develops, designs, and imports home products for wholesale and direct distribution. They specialize in tabletop, decor, and bedding and supply a diverse group of major brands and retailers such as Peacock Alley, Pottery Barn, and True Value. Owners Steve and Valerie Greenstein and six other employees and their respective families will relocate to the Triad with 28 total jobs expected within five years. Their wholly owned brands Bamboozle, Tiny Footprint, and Flybuster all focus around easy to use and ecofriendly items for the home. Their eco chic flagship line Bamboozle utilizes sustainable bamboo to create dishwasher safe and biodegradable homeware for everyday use.

General Insulation Company opened a facility in Trinity in April. The Trinity plant is one of 53 GIC facilities across the U.S. and Canada, and just the second branch operation in North Carolina as the company seeks to expand its customer base in the state. Asheboro native and industry veteran Tara Hoover has been hired to serve as the general manager of the Trinity branch. Headquartered in Massachusetts, GIC is a fabricator and distributor of insulation and related products including weatherization products, safety products, HVAC accessories, firestop products, and abatement products for commercial, residential, and industrial contractors. www.generalinsulation.com

Petty's Garage in Level Cross is expanding and pursuing new opportunities with a project under consideration that will expand the size and scope of the business and add jobs. The proposed project will expand the manufacturing of automotive parts and provide increased capacity for the custom restorations and modifications, including the OEM aftermarket business, for which Petty's Garage is so well known. The company also has future plans to bring engine building, which is currently outsourced, back to the garage and to establish a classic car dealership on the property. Planned capital investment in the project totals \$2,415,000, and the project would create 17 new fulltime jobs adding to the 33 already employed fulltime at Petty's Garage and the Richard Petty Museum. Petty's Garage has requested state assistance for this project in the form of a Building Reuse Grant to help with the cost of facility renovation and repairs. Randolph County will hold a public hearing on December 5 to consider authorizing the \$170,000 grant request and committing to the \$8,500 local government grant match requirement. Founded in 2008, Petty's Garage is Richard Petty's high performance speed shop which specializes in all high performance upgrades including superchargers, custom projects, and restorations. http://pettys-garage.com/

Local officials, students, RCC staff, and industry leaders gathered for the ceremony which included not only the presentation of a check, but also the unveiling of signage for the newly renamed Gene Haas Computer Integrated Machining Institute at RCC. According to Dr. Shackleford, RCC president, "The funds will help us close both the skills gap and the interest gap in Computer-Integrated Machining. We'll close the skills gap by continuing to provide the very best in machining education; and we'll close the interest gap



by using some of the funds to expose high school students to the career possibilities in advanced manufacturing." Manufacturing Day 2016

According to its dedicated <u>website</u>, "Manufacturing Day is a celebration of modern manufacturing meant to inspire the next generation of manufacturers." Manufacturing Day officially occurs on the first Friday in October, but Randolph County events took place a week later on October 14. In an effort to help close the manufacturing interest gap and bring awareness of local manufacturing careers, 250 eighth grade students from Randolph County Schools, Asheboro City Schools, Uwharrie Charter Academy, and Montgomery County Schools participated in a day singularly focused on manufacturing. The day began with industry tours with students visiting a manufacturing facility in their region. A number of local manufacturers participated, including PEMMCO Manufacturing, CPP Global, Jaeco Precision, Timken, DARRAN Furniture, Energizer, Klaussner, Sapona Plastics, and K-M Machine Company. Following plant tours, students convened at RCC for lunch and a panel discussion of local industry leaders. The day concluded with tours of RCC's advanced manufacturing program facilities for demonstrations and hands-on activities.

Apprenticeship Randolph Takes Shape

After several years of prodding by Nelson Smith of IV-S Metal Stamping in Archdale, a formal high school apprenticeship program will soon be a reality in Randolph County. Dubbed Apprenticeship Randolph, the program is taking shape with industry support and the guidance of local school systems and RCC. The program will initially focus on the need to fill advanced manufacturing positions in areas such as machining and mechatronics. As of this writing, ten companies have committed to participating in the program. Although there are many details still to finalize, Apprenticeship Randolph will generally be modeled after program information provided by Guilford Apprenticeship Partners. Broadly speaking the scope will be as follows:

- Rising high school seniors meeting eligibility requirements will apply for a limited number of available positions with sponsoring companies.
- Students who successfully complete the application process will begin the program by working through a six-week summer pre-apprenticeship.
- Students who successfully complete the pre-apprenticeship period will be invited to continue as an apprentice through their senior year of high school, splitting the day between school and the workplace.
- In years 2-4 of the program, apprentices will be employed fulltime by the sponsoring company where they will work four days per week and attend RCC tuition-free the fifth day.
- Upon completion, the employee will have a career opportunity, marketable job skills, a journeyman certification, and a two-year college degree with no out of pocket expenses.

The State of North Carolina again ranked 2nd in the annual business climate rankings published by Site Selection Magazine. Georgia held onto the lead spot for the fourth year in a row. The rankings are based 50% on a survey of site selection consultants in which they rank states by their business-friendly climate, and 50% based on objective data about project information about corporate facility projects.
